





















DIAGRAM SYMBOLS

 = Slip Stitch (slst)	 = Single Crochet 2 Together (sc2tog)
 = Chain (ch)	 = Single Crochet 3 Together (sc3tog)
 = Single Crochet (sc)	 = Double Crochet 2 Together (sc2tog)
 = Half Double Crochet (hdc)	 = Double Crochet 3 Together (sc3tog)
 = Double Crochet (dc)	 = Puff/Bobble/3hdc Cluster
 = Treble Crochet (tc)	 = 3 Double Crochet Cluster
 = Double Treble Crochet (dtr)	 = Shell Stitch
 = Work In Back Loop Only (blo)	 = Popcorn Stitch
 = Work In Front Loop Only (flo)	 = Front Post Double Crochet (FPdc)
 = Picot Stitch	 = Back Post Double Crochet (BPdc)

Crochet Diagrams are intimidating at first but once you get the hang of them, you'll never go back to a written pattern again!

Many crocheters are visual people - we learn and repeat what we see. This is the benefit of a crochet diagram; it is a visual representation of exactly what we need to do. Just take it one symbol at a time!
